## ADDITIONAL \$3 MILLION AWARDED THROUGH MICHIGAN HEALTH ENDOWMENT FUND'S RESPONSIVE GRANT PROGRAM

LANSING, Mich. – The Michigan Health Endowment Fund has awarded \$3 million to 37 organizations across all regions of the state through its Community Health Impact grant program. The Health Fund's responsive grant awards allow for meaningful investments that align with the foundation's mission and address one of eight focus areas. This round had a special emphasis on infant mortality and health services for foster and adopted children.

Seventy non-profit organizations and public agencies across the state submitted proposals for projects that would improve community health and wellness by expanding access to high quality, integrated health services for Michigan's seniors and children.

"Our responsive grants support critical work that might not fit into our proactive initiatives but addresses one of our eight focus areas, such as services for foster and adopted children," explained Chief Executive Officer Paul Hillegonds. "We invest in programs that support the state's most vulnerable residents while making a lasting positive difference in Michigan,"

Michigan's infant mortality rate is among the highest in the country, and several of the funded projects will work to address that challenge. For example, the Black Mother's Breastfeeding Association was awarded \$39,600 to expand their doula program, which will improve health outcomes for Detroit mothers and babies.

"Michigan's children and seniors are some of our most vulnerable residents, and both have specialized needs that are often overlooked or underfunded," said Health Fund Senior Program Officer Laurie Solotorow. "Through the Health Fund's responsive grants we can address these specialized needs and support programs with long-term potential for helping people."

Other funded projects focus on ensuring coordinated, comprehensive and quality primary care for foster and adopted children. For example, Macomb Children's Healthcare Access Program (MCHAP) was awarded \$100,000 for its Foster CARE program to create an integrated system of childhood support services healthcare for children in Macomb County.

The mission of the Michigan Health Endowment Fund is to improve the health of Michigan residents and reduce the cost of health care, with special emphasis on the health and wellness of children and seniors. Other proactive issue areas include healthy aging, and nutrition and healthy lifestyles. The fund was created as part of 2013 state legislation that allowed Blue Cross Blue Shield of Michigan to become a nonprofit mutual health insurer. The Health Fund has awarded more than \$50 million in grants since its creation.
